WELCOME TO THE NEW YEAR

During the short break the Clubroom was repainted (thank you to those who volunteered to do it; you know who you are) and the feedback to date has been favourable. We are looking at opportunities to improve the look of the Clubroom and would be happy to hear your ideas.

The Board is considering ways of improving the operation of the IAA to ensure that systems and processes have integrity, accuracy and reliability. This will require some investment in implementing necessary changes.

Some of you who attended the AGM will recall discussion about the conflicting financial data contained in the Financial Report for 2022-23 when compared to the previous year. Following the AGM the Treasurer met with the new auditor to discuss some of the issues. It was discovered:

- There were errors identified in the 2022 financial statement
- Accounts payable at 30 June 2022 were incorrectly reported
- Some transactions had been entered in 'accounts payable' and then recorded as 'expenses' resulting in double counting expenses

Following corrections made the operating loss was reduced to \$8096.00.

Naturally, the Board is keen to ensure that financial transactions are properly categorised and recorded and has taken steps to achieve this outcome.


